WE ARE LEARNERS

It's not just the kids who are "thinking together." This year saw the launch of **ThinkCon**, an annual development conference for Think staff. Employees spent three days in soft skills workshops and sessions on innovation topics like coding and social emotional learning. Speaking on trust-based leadership, Orenda Education leader Scott McGuire invited staff to consider their influence. "We have to practice leadership that inspires. Our school partners trust us to be on their team and driving toward the same 'why'."



TWEETING FOR BUDGET INCREASE

Think Together joined forces with families, educational leaders and community members across the state this year to advocate for a California budget increase to the After School Education and Safety Program (ASES). Originally passed in 2002, ASES provides a perpupil daily rate for afterschool programs. The 50-cent requested increase is critical to keep pace with rising minimum wage and allow providers (including Think) to continue serving current students. Thanks to a robust Twitter and phone campaign, as well as forward-looking leadership from California's Assembly, Governor Newsom acknowledged the rising cost pressures and responded with a \$50 million increase in the final 2019-2020 budget.



BOOK TOUR

Robin Avelar La Salle, Co-Founder and CEO of Orenda Education, has been criss-crossing California to introduce ideas from her latest book, *Shattering Inequities: Real World Wisdom for School and District Leaders*, co-authored with Ruth S. Johnson. Through invitations from county education offices, school districts, and leadership conferences, she's inspiring a new generation of equity leaders who have the power to change the trajectory of education for California students.


MILLION KIDS I'M CHEERING ON

Broadcom Inc. and Think Together partner to launch coding programs throughout California

INTRODUCING CODING into over 400

schools throughout California to impact over 150,000 kids annually may sound daunting. But we believe it's possible to change the lives of kids in underserved communities by preparing them to be our next-generation computer programmers and app designers. This is the motivation behind Think's Coding For All initiative.

Broadcom Inc., a global technology leader that designs, develops and supplies software solutions, has partnered with Think Together for over 10 years, providing much of the technology infrastructure the organization runs on today.

Only 13% of Think Together partner schools have the technology to implement coding programs. So Broadcom

has donated thousands of laptops for students to learn and practice on. Paula Golden, President of the Broadcom Foundation, says, "We view coding as not only central to a company like ours that's built around electrical engineering and computer science, but also as an essential skill that is important to the future of the world at large." And it's personal for her, too. "I stepped away from science in middle school because no one encouraged me," Paula shares, "If I'd had a Think Together in my life, I would probably be an engineer right now."

Global IT Manager Stanley Toh says, "Training kids in coding not only improves computing skills but it's a way for them to think outside of the box and also gives them confidence in their dreams for a bright future." "It's nice to see your company doing something for the community – these kids could be working here someday," shares IT Manager Leo Castillo. Broadcom wants its next generation of employees to come from the communities they've impacted. They want Think students. VP of Research and Development Ichiro Fujimori agrees, "That one STEM opportunity with a computer can change a person's life forever."

But what does it look like to introduce kids to coding - kids who have not had access to these types of programs before? We asked Breanna Caso, Think Together's new STEM Program Coordinator for the Riverside Region, to host an impromptu coding session during summer programming to see what would happen.

With bachelor's and master's degrees in Nano-Engineering from UC San Diego, Breanna Caso brings an incredible mind and drive to Think Together. She's passionate about encouraging more minorities and women to move into the STEM field. Her job is to continue to build and expand our STEM programs and provide awareness for Coding For All.

The 20 third-graders walk into the classroom full of anticipation. Breanna's already prepared their desks with computers and Lego kits.

There's an energy in the room; when Breanna announces that the kids will be building robots, they all cheer. "It's hot outside today, so we're going to build a cooling fan," she says.

The kids get to work building their fans, following directions on the computer. Once the fans are built, Breanna teaches them how to code their fans to go faster or slower, and even how to make noises. All the kids are in shock.

Dominic, Byron and Joel sit at one table. When asked what they want to be when they grow up, they all agree... scientists. Dominic looks over at Byron and says, "I hope we can be scientists together."

Joel continues, "I want to code and build something that will help my community." It's their first experiences with coding, but they're already dreaming about the future.

Hailey appears to be the only student with coding experience. And her fan is spinning long before the others. She says she practices at home. She also wants to be a scientist.

There's a resounding groan when Breanna tells the kids it's time to clean up. From the looks on their faces, this first coding experience could actually be that life-changing moment for some of them.

This is what Coding For All is about: making sure kids in California are prepared for the technology workforce.

And thanks to Broadcom's support, students at over 50 schools now have laptops and are on the path to becoming coding experts. We invite you to join in their future success as Think Together expands coding to provide thousands of kids with the same opportunities.

Getting LAUSD ready to go back to school

While their students sleep in enjoying their last few weeks of summer break, hundreds of teachers from 19 schools in Los Angeles Unified School District, Local District Central file into a cavernous multi-purpose room at Los Angeles Academy Middle School. It's 8:30 AM and the music is blaring.

This is Summer Institute, the week-long teacher training from

Orenda Education. With the air of professional conference

meets pep rally, each day a new theme - from movie stars to rockstars, Pink Ladies to superheroes - gets the teachers energized. And while the Orenda event may look like a costume party, the team is serious when it comes to learning.

and then passes the baton to Scott McGuire,
Orenda's Director of Educational Services. Scott
adeptly presents simple, big-idea strategies that

will increase student engagement and accelerate learning, while the teachers vigorously take Cornell notes balanced on their laps.

An organization that is driven
by data to drive continuous
improvement, Orenda has tested
every detail of Summer Institute to

achieve the best results. "We need to make this fun for the teachers - they are giving up a week of their summer to be here," says Danelle Almarez, Orenda's

Chief Academic Officer. "We also want them to be open to new ideas for teaching strategies."

Following the General Session, teachers are divided up by grade level into breakout sessions for math or English language arts. For the next few hours, they are immersed with "low-prep, high-impact strategies" led by the Orenda team. They call out "MVPs" (Most Valuable Points) at the end of each lesson, and absorb strategies, like "Fun, Fast, Furious," and "Golden Ticket" – names that may sound

like amusement park rides, but are so effective, teachers can't wait to use them when they return to their own classrooms. Together, the teachers identify rigorous content, and then make it engaging and fun with the Orenda strategies – an


important combination to ensure that their students are learning at grade-level.

Whether they dressed the part or not, the teachers are the superheroes of the week. Infused with new teaching strategies that they can immediately use in their own classrooms, they leave with a sense of purpose, newly prepared

to make a difference in student learning and, ultimately, in students' lives. §

CHANGING THE ODDS IN HIS COMMUNITY

After 20 years at Think Together, Jose Candelas has a good idea about what each day will look like - building bridges in the community between parents, kids and educators. But today is different.

Jose hears there's someone waiting for him in the lobby. He walks out and immediately recognizes Chantel Vasquez, even though it's been over 10 years since he's seen her. They first met 18 years ago when she was a Think student at Davis Elementary School. Now a college graduate, Chantel stopped by to say thank you for all the support throughout her elementary years.

Jose has always had a passion for helping kids. Originally planning on becoming a teacher, he was recruited by Think Together and joined the organization in 1999. A Santa Ana native, Jose spent the next eight years working in his community at Davis Elementary. "We really tailored the Think Together program at Davis around what the teachers needed, what the kids needed and what the parents needed," Jose shares, "We made it a win for everybody."

Chantel joined Think Together in first grade because her parents, both Spanish speakers, could not adequately support her with homework. She entered the program struggling with reading, writing and math; six years later, she was ready for honors classes in middle school.

"Without Think Together, I don't know what would have happened to me," Chantel says, "I definitely wouldn't have been able to go to college and chase my dreams." Chantel was accepted to Stanford University, UCLA, UC Irvine and UC Riverside, to name a few. She recently graduated from UC Irvine with a Bachelor of Science in Economics. Now she's studying for the GRE and preparing to apply to Cal State Fullerton's graduate economics program – Jose couldn't be more proud.

Today, Jose is impacting even more kids in the community as Think Together's Reach Out and Read Facilitator. "As the organization has expanded, it has stayed true to its mission," Jose says, "That's why I'm still here." Discussing her time at Think Together, Chantel shares, "It always felt like a second home, it was an amazing experience."

as a part-time pre-school playground assistant. 40 years later, she is a faculty member and site director at Santa Ana College where she runs a child development center. And that's what drew her to Alexandra.

Alexandra first heard about
Career Technical Education
(CTE) Internships when Bill
Fennessy, Think Together's
Director of Community
Partnerships and Work-Based
Learning, made a presentation
in her child development class.
Much like Susan, Alexandra had
always wanted to be a teacher,

and Bill inspired her to give an internship a try. She shares, "I want to be the one helping students and guiding them." Alexandra enrolled in the CTE program and, after an interview with Bill, was matched with Susan. Her journey into education had begun.

Alexandra fit right in at Susan's center, thriving in an environment where she felt safe and accepted. She completed her first internship and came back for a second because she enjoyed the work so much. Eventually, she gathered the courage to ask about a job, which Susan was thrilled to give her even though she was only 17. "She was the perfect candidate," Susan says. Today, the two women work together to educate and nurture pre-K kids.

As Alexandra shares her story, Susan has tears in her eyes,

"This is how you make a difference."

Alexandra has big dreams for the future. She's finishing her associate's degree at Santa Ana College with plans to transfer to CSU Fullerton for her bachelor's and master's degrees. Nodding in approval, Susan smiles and says, "My alma mater."

Two different generations but the same passion for kids – Susan and Alexandra have a lot in common. "Taking this internship is the best decision I've ever made," Alexandra says.

A key component to the AmeriCorps program is mentorship. Members are given guidance, training and direct experience in the field alongside experts. Our experienced Think Together staff work with each member to help them understand the expanded education workforce and find their place in it.


